#### KINDERGARTEN

In kindergarten, we are learning to do our best. Different people do better at different things. Some people do better at reading; some do better at math. Some people are great artists; some do well in sports. However, we all can learn how to do these different things through hard work and practice. This week we read The Little Engine that Could by Watty Piper and You Can Do It, Curious George! by Margaret and H.A. Rey. Both books led to discussions about asking for help, helping others, believing in ourselves, and trying our best. In language arts, we are identifying letter names and sounds, blending words, reading and writing high-frequency words, and writing sentences. In math, we are exploring measurement and shapes.

#### **FIRST**

First graders are branching out into reading short chapter books, learning to take AR tests and expanding our writing about what we have read. We are learning 2 digit addition and subtraction with "carrying" tens. First graders are continuing to enjoy drawing lessons with much success. We are looking forward to a teddy bear picnic sometime in May.

## **SECOND**

As we grow physically taller in second grade, we also grow in our knowledge and academics. In science we have been learning about insects and their life cycles. Our classroom pets for the last couple weeks have been ladybugs and we have been able to observe three stages of their unique life cycle. We anxiously await to see their eggs, which is the last stage we need to observe. Silk moth eggs from last year were just taken out of the refrigerator and we are hoping for larva to appear soon so we can explore the life cycle of a silk moth. In Religion, we are preparing for First Communion and learning how we can share God's love with others. God bless and keep reading at home!

Third grade is very busy! In science students are making comic strips to show their understanding of solids, liquids and gases. In social studies students are beginning their study of the U.S. Presidents. Students are eager to share their final reports with the class and parents! # FIFTH

Fifth Grade is looking forward to May! We began our Social Studies segment on the American Revolution War. We are learning all about the lead up to the Revolutionary War, as well as the many prestigious personalities of the era. Along with the classroom curriculum, the 5th Graders are preparing for our class musical, 13 Colonies. The students are perfecting their musical acts and honing their acting skills with Sr. Kircher, and we are all very much looking forward to the performances on May 26th. Also, we are also very excited to begin our Endangered Species project. Each student will complete a 5-paragraph report on an endangered species of their choosing, along with a short presentation to the class. As you can see, there is a lot to be excited about and it is hard to believe that there are only a handful of weeks before these kiddos are in Junior High!!

#### **SIXTH**

In Algebra-1 the students are nearing the finish line of the curriculum, solving quadratic equations. They just completed the first solving method, factoring standard form trinomials. Next method, graphing nonlinear equations. We will conclude with the quadratic formula and operations with algebraic fractions.

In Middle School ELA, the 6th Grade is wrapping up their investigation into The Westing Game and are actively putting together their Proofs of this multilevel who-done-it. The 7th and 8th Grades have completed their reading of William Shakespeare's Hamlet and created two wonderful story boards which now hang in the middle school hallway. The 7th Grade has just begun their reading of S.E. Hinton's The Outsiders, and the 8th Grade has begun their reading of Jerry Spinelli's Milkweed. The 8th Graders have all passed the written portion of the Proteus Project, and are now onto the presentation portion. They will present their projects to a panel of judges the second week of May.

#### **SEVENTH**

For the month of May, 7th grade will be studying the cultural world of the early civilizations in Mesoamerica. We will be covering the Olmec and the nations after them. 6th grade will be studying more of the Roman World, learning all about the Fall of the Roman Empire. 8th Grade will be transitioning from the Jackson Era of our Republic Nation to our Republic Nation expanding West, exploring the Mexican-American War. For P.E., We are going strong with Ping Pong! Middle School will be getting ready for tournaments at the beginning of May. Please bring your water bottles! Go Eagles!

#### EIGHTH

8th Grade is preparing for a strong finish to the year. We are looking forward to our upcoming field trips to Mendocino Headlands, Hendy Woods and the traditional end of the year eighth grade trips. As a reminder we will have an 8:30 am Awards Prayer Service in the church on June 10th followed by the graduation diploma Mass in the late afternoon or evening.
